pring has sprung and we are looking forward to a summer that we hope brings a return to "normal" activities. Over half of our library staff is fully vaccinated and we hope this trend continues throughout our community and our

In April, our reopening procedures included returning some seating in the library, newspapers available to browse again, extended time on our public computers and staff venturing out from behind the plexiglass to assist patrons at our copy machine, computers and other areas of the library. We have also ceased our quarantine process on all returned library items. No more quarantine means all items are checked in the same day they are returned.

he Afternoon Book Club is a relaxed group of people who just enjoy sharing a great book! They meet on the third Tuesday of the month at 2pm.






